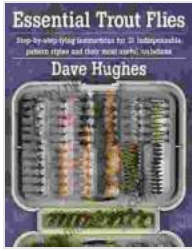

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Materials:

- Barbless fly tying hook, size 10-14
- Tan thread
- Light gray dubbing
- Grizzly horsehair
- Brown hackle

Instructions:

2. Tie in the horsehair at the tail, leaving a few strands hanging loose.
3. Dub a small amount of dubbing onto the thread and wrap it around the hook, forming a body.

2. Woolly Bugger

- Brown hackle
- Black marabou

Alternate Variations

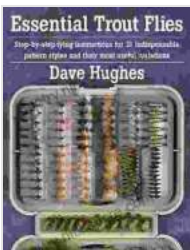
In addition to the basic tying instructions, we'll also provide alternate variations for many of the patterns. These variations can be used to customize the flies to match specific fishing conditions or target different species.

- Tan thread
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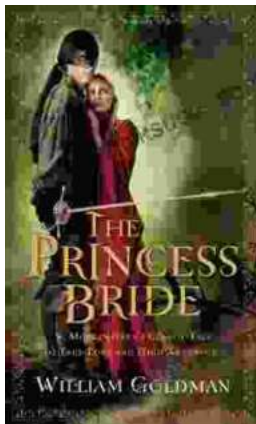
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
